Responses will shape how we move forward, so the more specificity, the greater the opportunity to identify themes for walking forth in grace.

and retreat leader, Roy Howard, who has deep roots with our congregation.

Together we will build a nest of community as we share meals, study, worship, and hike in what we call a Con-Ed event designed around the work of theologian, Andrew Root, and his two books, *Churches and the Crisis of Decline: A Hopeful, Practical Ecclesiology for a Secular Age* and *When Church Stops Working: A Future for Your Congregation beyond More Money, Programs, and Innovation.* Root has a book series that explores ministry in a secular age, and his work borrows or builds on the philosopher, Charles Taylor, who wrote *The Secular Age*.

Root tells the story of Martin Luther King, Jr. in a moment of deep crisis as violence was escalating in the battle for civil rights. One evening at home, while his family slept, a call came that threatened his family, and life's work. It sent him to deep prayer and in that prayer, King describes hearing God say to him, "Where there is no way, I will make a way." That phrase became a watchword for King, and the Civil Rights movement. as the civil rights leaders and participants waited. . . "they waited – their waiting, an action – because they knew that out of no way, God will make a way."

Root suggests that telling the story of our lives is a first step. "Where do I see God in my life and in the life of the people around me?" "In my life, and in the life of the people I encounter, how is God a character in that story?" At First Presbyterian, we are beginning to tell those stories in some new ways, and I am grateful for how you participate and share. Root says, "Congregations find their watchword when they discern a theme in their stories. A narrative thread links their lives together through shared experiences of a living God." As we move into the Fall, we will have more opportunities to gather, to tell stories, and to walk in God's grace.
