Pastoral Note

In the gospel of John, Jesus says, "I came that you might have life and have it more abundantly."

The Spiritual Formation Ministry Team is exploring the idea that we could have "pop-up" programs that create opportunities for fellowship and shared joy. These programs form folks in Christian faith. The process is simple. If you have an idea about where abundance of life and joy are known in your life, invite folks along so that we might share in that abundance. Someone loved going to movies and talking about them theologically. So, the Barbie movie pop-up was announced spontaneously at the end of a worship service, which created space for stories and formation!



Last weekend, another opportunity came up, to see God's beauty at Wakulla Springs with children and their families. The idea was born from a connectional church moment. Lori received a call from a PC(USA) member of a congregation in Georgia named Melba asking if we, at First, had someone who could help her do a memorial service for her husband at Wakulla Springs. He was a Florida State graduate who loved the park and wanted his ashes to be spread there with a simple memorial service with family and friends. She planned a boat ride led by the Ranger for all in attendance, then gathered folks for a shared meal. Afterwards, we moved to the platform for the inurnment of ashes. Jim and I were taken by the beauty and wonder of that evening and how gathering in Christ's name binds a people together.

As a member of the Sunday school teaching team, Jim wanted to share. So he made arrangements to rent the boat for Labor Day weekend and extended an invitation to the children of the church and their parents. And we filled the boat.

What I know is that children know the abundance of life in ways that I think adults have learned how to silence. We gathered for donuts before the boat ride. On the lawn, a spontaneous game of red light/green light emerged to get the wiggles out before we got on the boat. On the boat, one of the wonders was seeing baby alligators recently hatched — so recently that the eggshells were still visible. We learned that females build a mound nest of soil and vegetation, and deposit an average of 32-46 eggs in late June to mid-July. The incubation requires between 60-70 days. We literally saw abundant life that day! We marveled at the plethora of baby alligators and their shells scattered around the mound, and the protective momma alligator guarding her babies. And do you know what? A group of alligators is called a congregation.

I am seeing abundance of life in this congregation, First Presbyterian, and it gives me great joy.
