Wednesday, December 20: Taking Action for Those Who Are Unhoused. Host: Trinity United Methodist Church, Moor Hall. Participants will help fill backpacks with food and necessities and then go into the community to distribute them.

Pastor's Note

This week, I went back and watched Rosalynn Carter's memorial service. It was more than nostalgic to hear the stories; it was meaningful to hear how faith in Christ shaped the Carter family. The year 1976, when President Carter defeated Gerald Ford, was a big year. Our family took a trip to see the Grand Canyon to celebrate the Bicentennial and gas was only 59 cents a gallon. And I like to remind my middle brother, Gregg, that's the year he learned intimately that gasoline is an accelerant around flame.

People, places, and things change over time. Some change is predictable, and other change, not so much so — it's almost unfathomable.

This Sunday is my ordiversary. My husband, Jim, would say, "I didn't marry a preacher." He says that because I was a second career pastor. I would say, "This day marks the one I became a pastor, for real." Ordiversary is shorthand for the Sunday when I knelt in Spring Hill Presbyterian Church in Mobile, Alabama, pregnant with our third child, whom we had told no one about. Well, almost no one.

Grief over lost pregnancies was deep. Fear was the deep sea in which we waded. Despair yanked us under with a spot of blood, a cramp, and waiting for blood test results. We would say to each other, "We're having a baby ... maybe." It was snark masking grief; scarcity, entangled with fear. All of which complicated our ability to be joyful. Besides, it's hard to talk about bodily stuff. Reverend Dr. Anna Carter Florence preached the ordination. When we picked her up at the airport, we couldn't hold back our news. One of our pregnancy losses happened while we were in seminary. She helped us to grieve that death.

Imagine. Wonder of all wonders. We were in Advent — with the joy of an ordination to share, and expectant with new life. "Anna. We're pregnant." And ... in the swell of that news, we forgot to tell her that we hadn't told anyone. In a sermon about Jacob wrestling, on a sun warmed December Sunday afternoon, life was revealed. We didn't think we could really bear another life into this world that day; and nor could we have imagined that we'd live in Florida as empty nesters twenty some years later, serving the church I first met while serving as a seminary intern, running an urban mission camp. And yet, here we are. Together.

People, places, and things do change over time. Thanks be to God. This Sunday we enter into the church season of Advent and as a church we will use daily reflections from the book, *Embodied Light: Advent Reflections on the Incarnation* by Melissa Tidwell. The church season that leads us to Christmas reveals to us that God was willing to close the gap between humanity and divinity by entering into a fully human state.

God, in Christ, as fully human becomes one of us. He knows hunger and thirst; friendship and betrayal; hope and loss; joy and grief; and the agony of death. And — what I know about First Presbyterian Church is that we know some of those same things, and only because of Christ — whom we confess to be fully human and fully Divine. Advent asks us hard questions — "Why was Jesus born, anyway? Why were we?" Looking forward to this journey together.

God's peace, God's presence. Anne
