Pastor's Note

When visiting with a congregant recently I asked, "What's something you saw that was beautiful today?" Beauty is a marker of God's action in the world. Nature unfolds beauty, as do the arts, and even human connection. This congregant responded, "The Japanese Magnolia in our front yard. When I left for work, it hadn't bloomed and when I drove in tonight, it was beautiful." Spring is amazing. Things can change in the blink of an eye; the nature of something shifts over the course of a day. As I run down Meridian each morning, I've been watching a redbud tree break into the morning sunlight. Sometimes the beauty stops me in my tracks.

Last Sunday, we marked the end of the liturgical season of Epiphany and we passed out Epiphany star words. These cardboard stars with words written on them are a tool for reflection, a simple prompt for listening for God. As folks exited worship, some stopped for a picture with their star word, while others told me about last year's words that were still on the refrigerator. One member took stars to share with friends back at Westminster Oaks. This Sunday is Transfiguration Sunday, which is truly the last Sunday in the season of Epiphany before Ash Wednesday.

One of the best sermons I heard on this text was at a Festival of Homiletics. Peter and Jesus are making their way up a mountain and Elijah and Moses show up. John Calvin speculated that maybe at that moment, there were some ghosts of Elijah and Moses on the mountain top with Jesus. But then Calvin leads himself through an argument that says no, ... it "seems more likely to me that they really were brought to that place." Calvin makes room for the mystery.

This sermon at the festival set up that moment in the text differently. Peter is saying to Jesus on a mountain top, "I'm going to set up tents. One will be for Moses, another for Elijah, and the last one for you, Jesus; setting these tents up means we get to keep you all in one place." The Festival of Homiletics preacher described that moment as trying to "hold onto" Jesus. Not to "make room" for Christ, but trying to "control" Jesus.

Trying to "hold onto" Jesus limits his movement in the world. That is not how Christ moves or makes His way in the world. Christ calls and sends, but doesn't get pinned down in a tent in a particular way that we want, or way that we convince ourselves that we need. And it takes tending to our life of faith to listen for how Christ calls and sends.

Back to those stars: if you didn't get one last week, we will have some in the Narthex this Sunday, or I can mail one to you. It gladdens my pastoral heart to hear a story about something as simple as a star word. If that little silver star with a word helped you to listen for Christ's call, or to see beauty in a new way in yourself, or another, that's pretty fabulous. One small community effort of sharing the light of Christ with a star word could deepen your life of faith — and that is beautiful to me: to witness the vastness and variety of ways for how the life of formation in Christ is shaped.
