

### Pastor's Note

### "Attention is the beginning of devotion."

This Mary Oliver quote is one of my favorites. In her last book of essays called *Upstream* she remembers getting lost from her parents when they were walking through the woods. She doesn't remember the being lost part of that potential trauma, but instead the "charged moment of aloneness, the sense of going toward the source." She recognized God in the diversity found in the woods. "One tree is like another, but not too much. One tulip is like the next tulip, but not too much." She recognized God in the depth of focused attention. She ends that poem with this quote, "Attention is the beginning of devotion."

We have eight weeks left in this transitional interim period and I sense my attention being distracted by the stress of time coming to a close. First John says, "See what love that you have been given ..." and that is so true. I see that love in the time with which we have been able to tend, to give and to receive, attention with one another.

I woke up the day after the eclipse agitated. Part of me decided it was the distraction energy of the eclipse. In receiving counsel about the agitation, a helpful question emerged. Is the agitation helpful or harmful? What a great question that became as the week unfolded.

In a Zoom meeting, I became distracted when my intuition told me, "Speak up" and I didn't. That's unusual. That distraction instead of attention was harmful for the whole. So I called the leader and said, "I need to tell you about what happened on the Zoom last night because I have some lingering agitation."

And she responded, "I know. I saw it on your face. I'm glad you called."

"See what love that God has given us that we might be called children of God, ... and so we are." I learned to frame part of my agitation as the reality of grief as it settles. It is like those disciples on the road to Emmaus who stand still and look sad. I took my grief for a walk, to pay attention. Weeds are weeds, and no two weeds are the same. Light in the canopy of the trees is light, and no two breakthroughs of such light are the same. I took pictures and when I returned home, I looked at the picture and wrote a bit of a prayer. And in one picture, what I had not seen with my eye, in a purple weed, was the beauty of a honey bee.

Attention *is* the beginning of devotion. Indeed. God's Peace, God's Presence, Anne
