


Pastoral Note

The *Presbyterian Outlook*'s September 2024 issue on Reparations examines how the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. (PCUSA) is working to take steps to repair past racial wrongs. The issue defines reparation as making amends for a wrong committed by paying the wronged or helping them otherwise. My first introduction to the concept of reparations was when I read A Black Theology of Liberation by James H. Cone, where he references James Foreman's Black Manifesto, which demanded reparation from white churches for their participation in centuries of black exploitation. The manifesto demanded \$500 million in reparations from white churches and synagogues for their involvement in the injustices of slavery and segregation committed against African Americans.

A recent push for reparation began with a 2014 article in the *Atlantic* by Ta-Nehisi Coates titled "The Case for Reparations." Coates writes that after years of slavery and Jim Crow, America will never be whole unless the moral debt is satisfied. Many authors, like William Woo, began to address reparations as a way to respond to the effects of slavery and segregation on African Americans. In his book *What Kind of Christianity: A History of Slavery and Anti-Black Racism In The Presbyterian Church*, Woo writes that most Presbyterians, north and south, in the nineteenth century held racist attitudes and promoted slavery and anti-Black racism.

The Healing Racism Task Force at First Presbyterian Church addressed slavery and anti-Black racism in our church through a three-year search into the church's 192-year-old history. The search resulted in a plaque dedication on Sunday, January 21, 2024, acknowledging intolerance and calling everyone in God's name to love all humankind. After this noble and honorable effort by faithful believers in our congregation, the question remains: Where do we go from here? The Task Force will address this question and reparations in an Inquirers class at First Presbyterian Church on October 20, 2024.
