Care and Outreach Ministry Team

The mission program of our church is carried out by ministry teams. Each ministry team is designated by the session with a particular focus. Teams meet monthly or as needed and report to the session. These teams work together in cooperation with each other to support worship, service and spiritual growth in the church. This week highlights the Care and Outreach Ministry Team.

Care and Outreach is the group that takes care of our needs. It offers comfort and care for church members through meals, transportation, visits, and communication. Team members keep in contact with congregation members who need extra support. The team maintains a prayer chain as well as the published prayer concerns in the church bulletin. It welcomes visitors and new members to our church services. Care and Outreach Ministry Team members were instrumental in helping organize and test the church's Breeze digital information system.

The Team organizes receptions following memorial services, baptisms, and other events, and hosts informal social events that promote intergenerational fellowship. This Team supports us in times of joy and need while promoting opportunities for fellowship outside of formal worship such as "second Sunday lemonade" in the courtyard, the annual Christmas caroling and chili supper, distributing Poinsettias during advent, the Shrove Tuesday pancake supper, the Easter breakfast and egg hunt, and the annual church picnic. The team also assists with hosting outside groups using our facilities as a base for civil justice action, such as the Moms Demand Action for Gun Sense event last year. Currently, the Team is brainstorming ideas to encourage small group activities and interactions.

The Care and Outreach Ministry Team is led by Session member Peggy West, who has worked with the Team for many years, going back to when it was known as the Congregational Care Council. The Care and Outreach Ministry Team meets on the third Monday of the month at 6:00 PM via Zoom. Pastoral Note

The pastor's notes for the next few weeks will address different aspects of Presbyterian worship. This week, I will address the elements of worship as an introduction to the series. As we approach the Stewardship season, it seems appropriate to reflect on how we serve God in worship.

Presbyterian worship can be traced to the Reformation in Strasbourg under Martin Bucer, in Zurich under Ulrich Zwingli, and in Geneva under John Calvin. The order of worship that centuries of Christians have adapted from the pattern of Jewish worship is an ancient order intended to move us more deeply into intimate communion with God in Christ. Above all, God directs us to worship God by proclamation, prayer, and praise.

We gather in worship as an answer to God's call. God is the creator and object of our worship. Without the Spirit of God moving among us, worship is impossible. Worship occurs whenever we respond to God with praise, repentance, obedience, and service. There are six essential elements of worship: prayer, scripture reading and proclaiming, baptism and the Lord's worship, self-offering, and relating to each other and the world.

In prayer, we listen to God speak to us. While prayer in worship may commonly include expressions of adoration, thanksgiving, confession, and petition, no expression of honest thought or feeling is inappropriate for prayer. Prayer actions include kneeling, bowing, lifting our hands, dancing, clapping, embracing, anointing, and laying on hands in commissioning and ordination.

Scripture reading and proclaiming are to be clear, audible, and attentive to the meaning of the text. Anyone, including children and youth, may be invited to read scripture. The congregation's role in worship is to listen prayerfully, actively, and attentively to the Word that is read and proclaimed.

Baptism and the Lord's Supper are physical signs and spiritual gifts, including words and actions, surrounded by prayer in the context of the Church's common worship. Baptism is ordinarily celebrated in worship on Lord's Day. The presence of the covenant community bears witness to the one body of Christ, into whom we are baptized. The Lord's Supper is the sign and seal of our communion with the crucified and risen Lord. Worshippers celebrate the Lord's Supper by trusting in Christ, confessing their sins, and seeking reconciliation with God and one another.

We offer ourselves as an act of worship, going beyond giving money and possessions. Worship includes opportunities to dedicate ourselves to the church's mission worldwide. Minutes for mission and special worship are expressions of faith and work. Giving material offerings in the context of service worship is a self-dedication by the whole worshipping community.

When we relate to each other, we acknowledge that we do not worship in isolation.

Times in the worship service that are particularly appropriate for expressing our concern for each other include the gathering at the beginning of worship, during the confession and after the declaration of pardon, in times of greeting during the service, and in preparing for the people's prayers. We also express our individual and shared ministries during worship, witnessing the church's work worldwide.

Therefore, since

Therefore, since we are receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, let us give thanks, by which we offer to God an acceptable worship with reverence and awe.
