CAJM Affordable Housing Proposal Before the Leon County Commission Jan. 28

The Capital Area Justice Ministry (CAJM) proposal on affordable housing will be before the Leon County Commission on Jan. 28th. This proposal asks the Commission to set aside 20% of the county's annual Blueprint sales tax surcharge revenues for an affordable rental housing land acquisition and leaseback program. The proposal would yield about \$1.3 million in 2026, enough to incentivize development of about 34 new rental units for families earning extremely low and very low incomes.

Please encourage the commission to adopt this proposal by coming to the meeting at 3 PM on Tuesday, Jan. 28th, at the Leon County Courthouse. *Carol Weissert*

From the Heritage Committee: Early Landmark Events

April 1833: A notice in the *Floridian* newspaper invited "those who have subscribed towards building a Presbyterian Church in Tallahassee" to a meeting "to make arrangements for the erection of said building." **April 1835:** Thirty-five members pledged \$6000 to build a house of worship. **May 1835:** Trustees paid \$800 for the property at Adams Street & Park Avenue.

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Pastoral Note

Earlier this week, our nation inaugurated the 47th President of the United States.

Unlike four years ago, this was a peaceful transition of power. It was encouraging to see our nation uphold the ideals of freedom and justice for all, as expressed in our constitution.

The Right Reverend Mariann Edgar Budde, Bishop of Washington, powerfully conveyed this sentiment during the sermon at the Inaugural Prayer Service on Tuesday, January 21, 2025. This interfaith service was held at the Washington National Cathedral.

Reverend Budde's message was inspired by a call for unity following the divisive period of the presidential election. She described the foundations of unity as honesty, humility, and honoring the inherent dignity of every human being. She called for the president to show mercy, compassion, and empathy towards others, in the name of "unity that incorporates diversity and transcends disagreement." 

Moving Beyond the Confession of the Sin of Racism to Repair

A year ago, we placed a plaque on the outside of the sanctuary acknowledging that our history included the sin of racism and promised to "commit ourselves to repairing racism's breach, that God's beloved community might take form to and around us." The Task Force on Healing Racism is sharing weekly resources to deepen our understanding of the costs of that sin and to inspire us to act.

The Healing Racism Task Force this week recommends two local resources. *The Pain and the Promise: the Struggle for Equal Rights in Tallahassee Florida* is a book by local author Glenda Rabby; it traces the importance of Tallahassee in the civil rights movement in the 1950s and 1960s because of the most successful bus boycott in the region in 1956. In addition, there were early protest activities here by the Congress for Racial Equality. The book is in the local library. "Invisible History: Middle Florida's Hidden Roots" is a documentary by the FSU Film School's Valerie Scoon. The film describes the little-known history of plantations and slavery in North Florida. Originally produced for PBS, it is available online on pbs.org or YouTube.
