# **Celebrating Black History Month**

Our speaker will be <u>Ted</u> <u>Ellis</u>, director of the Civil Rights Institute at FSU. Please plan to join us; all are welcome!




## Moving Beyond the Confession of the Sin of Racism to Repair

A year ago, we placed a plaque on the outside of the sanctuary acknowledging that our history included the sin of racism and promised to "commit ourselves to repairing racism's breach, that God's beloved community might take form to and around us." The Task Force on Healing Racism is sharing weekly resources to deepen our understanding of the costs of that sin and to inspire us to act.

As we look forward to honoring and celebrating Black History Month in February, the Task Force on Healing Racism recommends a book and a PBS series. *Skin we are in*, by Sidiwe Magona and Nina G. Jablonski, is a children's book that traces the evolution of skin color and celebrates the glorious human rainbow that we all are. While it is aimed at children, it contains useful information for every age. It can be found in the Christy Williams Library. "The Black Church: This is Our Story, This is Our Song" is a documentary hosted by Henry Louis Gates, Jr., for PBS, based on his book of the same title. It traces the 400-year history of the Black Church and describes the revolutionary impact it has had through the centuries on the development of Black culture and a deep faith that has weathered every attempt at suppression. It can be viewed on PBS and YouTube. Dr. Gates' PBS series, "Finding Your Roots," is also a rich resource, especially for the difficulty that our Black brothers and sisters have in tracing their families even as far back as the times of slavery.
